t is my pleasure to be writing in this edition of the Messenger. For Maritime Christian College (MCC), this season has an element of excitement to it.

For instance, we have students taking courses this summer in our Master of Arts in Disciple Making & Ministry Leadership Program. We are actively recruiting new students for our MA and Certificate-level courses being offered in the fall 2023 semester. We are working with churches to support their efforts in disciple making by offering courses and consulting for their elders, ministry team leaders, and disciple makers.

This issue features our annual "dashboard" of the finances and student enrollment for Maritime Christian College. The past year has been characterized by the launch of several important initiatives at MCC. I am deeply thankful for God's provision and the Holy Spirit's guidance of MCC during the past year.

Some readers may have noticed that I am using a different byline for this article. For the past three years I have been using the title of "Chief Operating Officer" in my role at MCC. It was my suggestion to our Board of Directors that I use this title in 2020, even though I was taking on the responsibilities traditionally carried out by the President, to see if I was a good fit for the role. After three years in the role, it seems that now is a good time to adopt the title of President, and the MCC Board recently approved that transition.

It is a look to the future, though, not the past, that I would like to share now.

In 2022 MCC developed a vision for the next decade - you can read it at <u>www.</u> <u>mccpei.com/mcc-vision</u>. I hope you will recognize the high degree of dependency we have on the Holy Spirit to come even remotely close to achieving that vision!

There is a passage of Scripture in the New Testament where Jesus lays down a challenge to people who said they wanted to follow him. It is found in Luke 9:

Luke 9:57-62: ⁵⁷As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." ⁵⁸And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." 59To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, let me first go and bury my father." ⁶⁰And Jesus said to him, "Leave the dead to bury their own dead. But as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." 61Yet another said, "I will follow you, Lord, but let me first say farewell to those at my home." ⁶²Jesus said to him, "No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." (ESV)

These statements sound tough and harsh for people who outwardly said they wanted to follow Jesus. But Jesus spoke truth to people who wanted the benefits of following him without paying the price it takes to truly experience lesus in a life-altering way. To use a modern equivalent, it is like someone saying, "I want to go from being physically out of shape to being very fit and athletic - but I don't want to exercise or change my diet". Let me be clear: rapid and profound change in our western society is upon us, and none of this change is aligned with a biblical worldview that we have embraced in North American society for the past few centuries. Other leaders inside the North American church are already sounding the alarm about these changes and their impact on our communities and our churches. Unfortunately, many churches are not prepared to adequately respond to these challenges.

For the past four years, MCC has been on a path to re-imagine Christian higher education by focusing on the theology and practical application of disciple making. We need more disciples of Jesus who are committed to obeying lesus' command to go and make disciples. To reframe what Jesus said in Luke 9:62, MCC is not looking back and wishing things in our society could be different. We are looking ahead at the work that needs to be done to make disciples for the Kingdom of God, and courageously addressing the challenges with the tools that we have available to us. We are excited about the future that lies ahead of us!

Student Bursaries - \$40,000/year

Many students find the cost of higher education a significant financial burden.

As enrollment rises, MCC wants to increase the number of bursaries available so the majority of students receive some form of financial support.

The second of the three pillars of MCC's "Meeting The Challenge" Campaign is increasing the amount of funds the College is able to direct to students through bursaries. Many students taking MCC's online disciple making courses work in jobs connected to some form of Christian ministry. The cost of taking graduate and undergraduate level university courses can pose a barrier that may prevent them from taking full advantage of the courses being offered by MCC.

MCC has been blessed over the past decades with donations from supporters that have been used to fund bursaries for students. Many of these donations have been set up in the form of an investment whereby the interest generated each year is directed towards bursaries. In the past year MCC was able to provide \$25,987 directly to students in the form of bursaries to offset the cost of taking courses. Over 70% of students in the last semester were able to get some amount of bursary funding.

Like virtually everything in our society, the cost of developing and providing Christian higher education courses has risen over the past few years. MCC's tuition rates for graduate and undergraduate courses have been kept as low as possible to minimize the barrier for students to take courses. In fact, MCC has not increased tuition rates for undergraduate-level Certificate courses in the past four years. Likewise, even though MCC's tuition cost for our new Master of Arts in Disciple Making & Ministry Leadership courses has been set to allow a student to complete their degree for about \$10,000 (Canadian),

this amount can still pose a significant financial challenge for students operating in ministry roles.

MCC is continuing to see growth in the number of students taking courses. While this is a great blessing, the overall amount of bursary funds available is staying about the same, with the result being less funding available for each student. Our vision is for every student to receive a bursary that covers at least 50% of tuition costs, and to have students finish their program with little to no debt.

One of the ways for supporters to increase the funds for bursaries is to support MCC's Legacy Fund. The donations and interest generated in this fund provides an opportunity for donors to support the concept of "giving in perpetuity". MCC can direct donors to legal, financial, and tax professionals to assist donors in planning a gift to the Legacy Fund.







ANNUAL Enrollment and Financial Reports

Academic Program Highlights from 2022-2023

- A new online Master of Arts in Disciple Making & Ministry Leadership Degree was launched
- 44 students enrolled in online classes: 33 in undergrad programs and 11 in the master's program. Geographic location: from Canada-31 (AB-2, MB-1, NB-11, NS-5, ON-3, PE-8, QC-1), Ethiopia-1, Nigeria-2, UK-1, and USA-9 (IL-1, KY-1, OK-1, TX-5, VA-1)
- First students graduated in May 2023 from the Disciple Maker Certificate-Level 1, the first online courses started in September 2020
- The four-year Bachelor of Arts (Bible) Degree and one-year Biblical Studies Certificate were put on hold due to low enrollment
- The KT Norris Lectures were held in May 2023 after having to cancel for 2 years due to Covid restrictions; David Nelson, Real Life Ministries Texas, spoke on the theme "Rooted & Established"
- The first online MCC Yearbook was published and posted to our website covering the school years 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 previously Decade Books were published and sold in hard cover format
- The 503 University Avenue property was sold and the MCC office relocated to rented space inside Sherwood Christian Church in Charlottetown this will allow MCC to focus on its mission to equip disciple makers using its online learning format




2022 Operating Revenue

Fiscal Highlights

- A decrease in donations from churches and individuals of -11.5% caused a higher draw on investments
- An increase in dorm rentals to full capacity helped offset building costs
- A sustained increase in furnace oil prices nearly doubled the cost for 2022 from the previous year
- Received \$20,000 for the Legacy Fund (not shown in Operating Revenue)
- An increase in payroll due to an increased number of online courses delivered by adjunct professors
- An increase in promotion costs due to online marketing; and travel to churches and events now that Covid restrictions have eased
- Hurricane Fiona caused \$25,000 damage most of it was repaired through insurance, the provincial disaster relief fund, and a church donation.






A ay 1, 2023 was the closing date for the sale of the Maritime Christian College property at 503 University Avenue. This property had been purchased in 1993 to realize the dream of being adjacent to the University of Prince Edward Island where numerous students could attend classes in MCC's facility and live in the dorm while completing their ministry degree. At the time it appeared MCC's enrollment would continue to rise like other Bible colleges throughout Canada and the United States.

Nobody expected the drop in student enrollment which colleges have faced within the last five years. For example, MCC's fulltime student numbers have been on a downward trend since the 1995-1996 school year.









Changing Educational Landscape

Paul E. Boatman in the August 1, 2022 *Christian Standard* article identified several areas of impact which have brought about changes in biblical higher education:

- Financial management problems Lean financial pockets.
- Education has become costly [In the US] Title IX (1972) requirements in a fluid culture of interpretation may lead to no government support.
- Cultural trends have devastating impacts on schools – Bible education is not considered a viable option for future employment.
- Megachurches have impacted Bible colleges in negative ways – some megachurches partner with Bible colleges while others have walked away.
- Administrative mistakes lead to closure spending one's way out of debt.
- Higher education trends challenge Bible colleges lowcost community colleges with practical certificates with jobs waiting for students pull students away.
- Digital revolution has transformed all education digital education is growing.¹

Because of the areas of impact above, Lincoln Christian University (LCU) reorganized its education model and dropped all nonministry related degrees from their undergraduate program in 2022. The remaining two undergrad degrees are ministry related. LCU is returning to its roots of *The Preachers are Coming*. Financially they sold half of their campus and removed a major portion of debt. These drastic steps are a means to have a future.

Likewise, St. Louis Christian College (SLCC) saw a dramatic drop. Terry Stine, former President of St. Louis Christian College, stated, "43 out of 100 students decided not to come to SLCC, canceling their registrations just two weeks before the start of class."² Declining enrollment, campus location, and financial challenges led St. Louis Christian College to merge with Central Christian College of the Bible. Earlier Central Christian College of the Bible resurrected Cincinnati Christian University into the Christian Church Leadership Foundation (CCL) with the Russell School of Ministry and the CCL Network after it closed in 2020 because of financial decisions and accreditation concerns.

"David Fincher, president of Central Christian College of the Bible in Moberly, MO, [stated,] '... Much of the 20thcentury history of the Restoration Movement is tied to the training on that campus and the work of its graduates ... Having these resources ensures their stories and legacy can continue to inspire and inform future students, scholars, and ministers for our churches."³

May 31, 2020, Hope International University closed their Nebraska Christian College campus following a merger to save the school. The declining enrollment and financial constraints led to the Board of Trustees decision to close the campus.

Moving Toward the Future

Maritime Christian College faces similar challenges as other Restoration Movement schools. Starting in 2019, MCC addressed these challenges by:

- Reorganizing its educational model from inperson to online,
- Hiring an online education specialist,
- Focusing on disciple making as a priority,
- Establishing partnerships with disciple making emphasis,
- Switching the target audience from 18-22-yearolds to adult education,
- Creating a masters in disciple making,
- Pausing non-performing programs,
- Setting up a MCC office in a new location.































The last bullet point required over a year's worth of preparation and is still ongoing in some areas. The first question was how large of a space would be required? Would there be in-person classes? Would we move the whole library? How many offices would be needed?

MCC decided to minimize its office footprint, and leverage what was learned from following Covid restrictions, where working from home became the norm. It was determined one large open-office concept for multiple uses was the best approach. The College is now located at 9 Lilac Avenue in Charlottetown, renting office space inside Sherwood Christian Church. Office hours are Wednesday 9-4, and staff work from home the rest of the week.

Penny Ching, Director of Finance and Administration, and Ellen Arsenault, Administrative Assistant, organized the packing and moving of all MCC College records and their offices. A second room at Sherwood Christian Church houses the College records, storage, and network equipment. Tom Marshall, Academic Dean, organized the packing and moving of the College library along with the College archives which is now located in a third room of the MCC offices.

Stephen Weatherby was hired part-time to assist with the office relocation. Throughout the moving preparations, whether at the old building or the new offices, Stephen acted as the hands and feet for a lot of the packing, electrical, and manual tasks involved within the move. Stephen also oversaw the posting of items for sale the College would not be taking to the new office space. Sam St. Coeur, Building Supervisor, assisted Stephen throughout the move. President Richard Jones, Nancy Jones, and Greg and





Pat Nicholson cleaned out rejected library books in preparation for the move. Tim Cook and Joel Crouse cleaned up the fallen trees left by Hurricane Fiona in the fall and a local company was hired in April to remove the tree debris.

The greatest challenge was on April 30, 2023 which was the official move-out date for MCC and it's UPEI residents. Hours of hauling, vacuuming and mopping were completed that day. Every room from the top floor down to the furnace room was emptied and cleaned by the May 1, 2023 closing date.

The new offices needed flooring, painting, doors, and lighting. Shelving and cabinets needed to be set up for the books, College records, office supplies and equipment. The completion date was planned for the week of the KT Norris Lectures to allow supporters to view the new facilities.

MCC faculty and staff are excited for this new chapter in the history of MCC, despite the many challenges facing Bible colleges today. MCC will continue to fulfill the mission to biblically educate and equip people to become disciples of Jesus who make disciples because the founders were accurate when quoting John 17:17, "Sanctify them in the truth; Thy word is truth" (NASB).⁴


