Reclaiming the Innovative Spirit of the New Testament Church for the 21st Century

There are two themes highlighted in this edition of the Maritime Messenger.

The first theme is celebrating the foundation Maritime Christian College (MCC) has built over the past 62 years in supporting the training of men and women for Christian service. An example of this strong foundation is the Mary & Martha Auxiliary, a group that has provided MCC with exemplary support for many years. In 2021 this group made a decision that they could no longer carry on with their service in the ways they had done it in the past, and this ministry was ended. It was our privilege to host a celebration luncheon with many of the Mary & Martha Auxiliary's members in December 2021 at MCC.

The second theme is about strategically examining the world we are living in and making decisions about how Maritime Christian College can best support the future needs of the church. The MCC Board of Directors, staff, and supporters have been praying, fasting, and discussing how MCC can best deliver on its core purpose of educating and equipping men and women for Christian service. I would like to share the story of MCC's journey from 2019 to today and how that journey is shaping our future plans for 2022 and beyond.

In the spring of 2019 I participated in a call with several leaders in the Restoration Movement in North America who were involved in planting and growing new churches. The team from MCC asked these church leaders for advice on how MCC might be able to better support the revitalization of declining churches and the planting of new churches in Canada. Their answer was very direct and simple: we should be focusing on making disciples first, and the revitalization and planting will naturally grow out of that activity.

This discussion was one of several we had that seemed to confirm where the Holy Spirit was already leading MCC. MCC staff worked on putting together a curriculum for a 1-year Disciple Maker Certificate and we attended three conferences in 2019 and early 2020 to get feedback. MCC received strong endorsement for offering higher education undergraduate level courses focused on the theology and practical application of disciple making.

In January and February 2020 MCC staff and Board members traveled around the Maritime provinces to hold discussions with different church leaders about our plans to focus on disciple making. Following these meetings, MCC started executing its plan to offer a fully online Disciple Maker Certificate for the Fall 2020 semester. Our main goal at that time was to test whether we could develop and deliver high-quality online courses that more part-time students would be interested in taking. Once MCC made the commitment to have courses ready for fall 2020, our efforts accelerated during the spring and summer. Dr. Jerry Scripture joined our staff and was instrumental in guiding the structure and format of our online courses. We were able to attract several church leaders from across North America to develop specific courses on disciple making and then do the online instruction required to make sure students received a high-quality experience in this new online format. We even developed and delivered our first online courses in our CoVocational Certificate, which was another test to see if this format would be useful in helping leaders start new Christian-based ministries in their communities.

When we launched the first online courses in MCC's Disciple Maker Certificate, we were excited to see 23 students sign up, many of whom had never taken courses at MCC before. The feedback we received from course developers, course instructors, and those students, combined with the direction we continued to discern from the Holy Spirit, gave MCC validation that our first experiment with this online format and disciple making focus had been successful. In 2021 we accelerated and expanded our plans and we started delivering two new Certificate Programs with specialized focus on disciple making for church leaders and for youth leaders. Including the current Winter 2022 semester, we have had an average of 21 students taking at least one course over the past three semesters.

Throughout 2021 MCC also conducted a realistic review of our 4-year Bachelor of Arts (Bible) Degree. Enrollment in this 4-year program has been slowly declining over the past two decades to the point where we had no full-time freshmen in this program in 2021. The MCC Board of Directors recently approved the recommendation from staff and faculty to change the format of this undergraduate degree to a fully online 4-year experience. This means we will have to develop the courses using our online delivery format, which is a considerable effort. Our first classes in our new online Bachelor of Arts (Bible) Degree will be offered in the Fall 2022 semester.

To coincide with the new format for our 4-year Bachelor of Arts (Bible) Degree, MCC is also pursuing accreditation of this program by the Association of Biblical Higher Education (ABHE). This is a significant undertaking for MCC that we have never done before. You can read more about this initiative in an article by Tom Marshall, MCC's Academic Dean, in this Messenger.

All of this activity will take significant resources, including money. MCC's Board and staff take very seriously the importance of being good stewards of MCC's finances, both in the way we receive money and in the way we spend money.

MCC's Board approved a 2022 budget that will require the most spending on course development and student recruitment that we've ever attempted. This means we also need to raise more money from both existing and new supporters, including grants from foundations and donations to our new Legacy Fund.

In our 62-year history, Maritime Christian College has been blessed with a base of core supporters who have given sacrificially from their income and assets to advance the mission of the College. I believe this sacrificial giving is one reason why the Lord has allowed MCC, despite its small size, to be in a position to be planning for the future of Christian higher education and disciple making in Canada.

At the same time MCC is looking to increase giving from our supporters, we are continuing to be diligent in the way we spend money and manage our assets. The hallmark of good stewardship is not to just stop spending money on everything, but to evaluate the core areas where spending will produce a long-term increase in the number of disciple makers, and to reduce spending on things that are no longer helping us fulfill our mission. Our Board and staff will continue our diligence in this area.

If you have stayed with me this far in reading this article, I hope you will now have a better understanding of why it is titled "Reclaiming the Innovative Spirit of the New Testament Church for the 21st Century". If we remain "on course" with our plans I've just outlined and stay aligned with the movement of the Holy Spirit, the next three years will see MCC go through some of the most significant changes since the College was founded in 1960. We are praying that we will experience a Spirit-led transformation of the way MCC educates and equips multiple generations of students using online courses, which in turn will catalyze a revitalization of disciple making in existing and new churches across Canada and around the world.

MCC invites both current and future supporters to join us on this journey as we step courageously into a world that needs, now more than ever, followers of Jesus who make disciples.

KT NORRIS LECTURES CANCELLED FOR 2022

Planning for the KT Norris Lectures takes place several months in advance of the actual event in March. Due to COVID-19 gathering and traveling restrictions in place across Canada in early 2022, MCC made the decision at that time to cancel the KT Norris Lectures for March 2022. Meeting the Challenge

The Challenge

In a recent Christian Standard article by Chris Moon titled "The Ministry Pipeline,"^[1] 16 Restoration Movement Bible Colleges were surveyed concerning the gap between ministry graduates and liberal arts graduates. Since 2007 ministry related degrees have fallen and are at their lowest since 2000. This trend is true for Maritime Christian College.

Young people simply aren't as interested in traditional, full-time ministry, said Paul Alexander, president of Hope International University. And churches are not challenging them like they did a couple of generations ago—when a pastor might pull a young person aside and encourage the pursuit of ministry.

The Response

All Restoration Movement Bible colleges and universities are facing this challenge of low interest in ministry education.

But what do we do about it?

First, the College shifted its focus toward making disciples as the means to turn around this trend by offering a new Disciple Maker Certificate in the fall of 2020. The College had already planned to launch online options just as Covid-19 hit and MCC continued to host classes throughout the pandemic. MCC has launched three more online certificates with disciple making at their core. It is a long-term effort. Non-traditional students have shown interest in these certificates and now fill most of MCC's classes.

Second, the 4-year Bachelor of Arts (Bible) Degree, 2-year Bachelor of Bible and Ministry Degree, and 1-year Biblical Studies Certificate are still MCC's foundational programs. These will all be online Fall 2022. The catch centres on student numbers. The minimum cohort equals 6 students taking a class otherwise it is not cost effective or a good learning experience for the students. The College has honoured its commitments in the past when student numbers were below the cohort level by providing the necessary courses, but this is not ideal. Credit must be given to MCC's adjunct professors who met this challenge by giving their time and talents at a reduced cost.

Low numbers are the new reality for MCC and many other Bible colleges and universities. One could blame cultural changes but this will not fix the problem. Ultimately this is a Church wide problem. Or should I say opportunity. Now is the time for the Church to shine. Priority must be given to raising Godly children into Godly teens and ultimately Godly college students by discipling them and encouraging them to pursue ministry. Each Restoration Church in Canada should be encouraging one or more members each year to engage in some level of advanced learning to build up the Kingdom.

Third, MCC also needs accreditation. But what is accreditation?

The Association of Biblical Higher Education (ABHE) partners with schools to raise the quality of the institution by meeting 11 standards of excellence. These same standards are met by sister schools and reassures parents and students that the institution is achieving its stated mission.

MCC has not had accreditation before—so why now?

The College is at a crossroads. Online learning is replacing traditional methods. Non-traditional students are choosing Biblical education later in life. Youths out of high school are bypassing ministry education for secular alternatives. Accreditation increases MCC's brand and the standards will improve MCC's ability to assist students to achieve their education goals. An accredited institution attracts potential students and donors more than one which is not accredited.


In September, MCC launched its efforts toward meeting the 24 Conditions of Eligibility for Accreditation by going through the ABHE check list and identifying where MCC falls short of eligibility. The College will tackle each area of need until eligibility is met. Once eligibility is met MCC will apply for accreditation. An ABHE team will visit the College and assess the application. If MCC meets ABHE's 11 Standards the College will receive probationary status of accreditation until it has met all the ABHE time requirements and be fully accredited. The whole process will take a few years after the Conditions of Eligibility are met.

So where do you come in? Throughout the ABHE material there are references to the community of supporters, alumni, churches, organizations, and individuals who should be a part of the accreditation process. Maritime Christian College was started because a group of like minded individuals and churches pooled together to make it happen. Likewise today is the day where our generation can help MCC become an accredited institution where young and old alike can learn about God's Word and be trained as disciple makers.

How can you help?

1. Contribute to MCC's Legacy Fund (please contact Penny Ching or Richard Jones for more details).
2. Contribute toward MCC's accreditation efforts by becoming a FRIENDS monthly donor. For example ABHE guidelines specify 2.5% of the College general budget should be for library resources.
3. Take a discipleship course and begin discipling your family.
4. Encourage young people to consider ministry as a vocation.
5. Take the next step as a second career in disciple making by applying for a certificate.
6. Support your church's youth program by volunteering.
7. Support your local church camp.

Learners and Servants

On November 15, 2021 I sat down and interviewed Jacquie Laird (President) and Mary Hickox (Treasurer) in the Board Room of Maritime Christian College (MCC). The Mary & Martha Auxiliary has supported MCC for 33 years but due to age and growing health concerns they have decided to close the Auxiliary down. I met with them in order to find out how this organization began and learn a little history about their support of the College. Both Jacquie and Mary contributed to these answers.



What was the spark for creating the Mary and Martha Auxiliary?

At the time the College occupied the Education Building which belonged to Central Christian Church. It was old and very tired looking. Sandra Rashed, Sheila Crockett, Marilyn Lewis (Stewart Lewis was President) and Mary Hickox met a number of times to discuss the possibility of starting an auxiliary that would serve as a support group. "We sent a questionnaire to individuals in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and PEI. In order to determine whether or not there was sufficient interest to proceed. The interest was there so we started. Sandra Rashed was our first president.

What do you see as the purpose of the Mary and Martha Auxiliary?

Mary and Martha's purpose was to support the College in financial ways to enhance the building. The building, as you know, was old, drafty, and cold. Our purpose was to improve the surroundings for the people who worked there.

What was the first big project?

Our first major project was the renovation of the gymnasium. Gordie Ohl came in from Murray Harbour day after day and pretty well did all the work. New windows were put in at the time.



What was the new building like on University Avenue?

Clean but also tired. Years later, there was some kind of social after chapel on Wednesday and I was sitting and looking around the chapel. I remember saying out loud, "I was just looking around here at the floor, at the walls, at the lights, and the windows and Mary and Martha paid for it all."



We also redid the guest suite next to the chapel. For years the Auxiliary cleaned the guest suite whenever we had a visitor stay.

We also purchased 50 plus windows for the new building. We pretty well worked year after year helping Les Farewell clean all the rooms after the



students left. We've cleaned the kitchen downstairs dozens of times from top to bottom. We paid for everything we were asked to help with.

I often wished we added up the amount of money we took in over the years—\$11,000-\$12,000 a year.

What other projects did you fund?

I expect we've bought all the office equipment. When the need was there and we had the money we bought it.

Is there any project you did which made you proud?

We were very blessed to be able to finance the necessary renovations in order to accommodate a physically challenged student. These alterations allowed the student to be able to live in residence.

Les Farewell was right by our side whenever we did anything at the College. Harold Nicholson was also helping and they both saved Mary and Martha money doing the work themselves.

What fun things did the Mary and Martha participate in through the years?

Our first event was in the old building where we met. Helen MacRae and Joey Rowledge performed a song about the Murray Harbour Chowder. Other men like Stewart Lewis, Silas McKay, and Harold McDonald participated in our gatherings.

MCC celebrated the Mary and Martha Auxiliary with a Christmas Tea on December 8, 2021 to honour their 33 years of faithful service. Tom Marshall and Richard Jones kept the tea cups filled and everyone enjoyed the time of fellowship. We are very thankful for the many years of dedicated service the Mary & Martha Auxiliary have provided to Maritime Christian College. Thirty-one people plus four MCC staff attended.



Some Favourite Mary & Martha Recipes

Vegetable Squares

1 pkg crescent rolls (jumbo size)
1 envelope ranch dressing mix
1 ½ (8oz) pkg cream cheese
1 cup Miracle Whip
Vegetables of your choice

Press crescent rolls into 1 large cookie sheet. Bake at 375 F degrees for 8 to 10 minutes or until browned. Cool completely. Beat cream cheese, Miracle Whip and dressing mix together until well blended. Spread the cheese mixture on the cooled crust and top with finely cut raw vegetables. Colourful vegetables add eye appeal, e.g. broccoli, seeded tomatoes, green onions, radishes, sweet red and green peppers, black olives, shredded carrots or vegetables of your choice. Cover and chill 2 to 3 hours. Cut into squares and serve.

Hickox Christmas Plum Pudding

½ cup ground suet
½ cup grated carrot
½ cup grated potato
½ cup sour milk
½ cup brown sugar
½ cup molasses
½ tsp cloves
½ tsp cinnamon
½ tsp allspice
½ tsp salt (or more to taste)
½ tsp heaping baking soda

Sticky raisins, mixed fruit, pineapple, red & green cherries

Mix all together and steam for 2 to 2 ½ hours. Flour to thicken.

Date Squares

Base:
1 ½ cups flour
½ tsp soda
¾ tsp salt
1 ¾ cups rolled oats
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup butter

Filling:
2 cups chopped dates
½ cup sugar
1 cup water
1 tsp lemon juice

Base: Mix together and press half of the mixture in a 8"x8" pan.

Filling: Simmer until soft and thick, stirring with whisk. Cool 10 minutes. Spread filling over mixture in pan, and top with remaining mixture.

Bake at 350 F degrees for 35 minutes.


